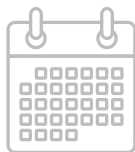

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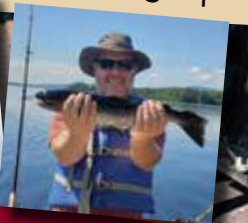

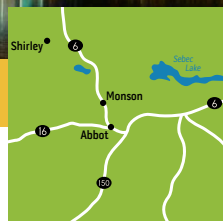

MONSON

Monson is located in Piscataquis County. It has a population of 609 residents, according to the 2020 Census. The Town of Monson is known for its slate. The final resting place marker of President John F. Kennedy is made from Monson slate. Monson is also famous for being an Appalachian Trail Community.



The beginning of the 100 Mile Wilderness starts here, which is the last 100 miles of the infamous Appalachian Trail. Monson is home to various artisans, including pottery, painters, and furniture makers. The town is home to Hebron Lake and Little Wilson Falls, as well as many ponds and streams. There are many miles of ATV and snowmobile access as well.

ABBOT

Abbot is located in Piscataquis County. It has a population of around 650 residents, according to the 2020 Census. The town was named for the treasurer of Bowdoin College, John Abbot.



Abbot is home to Kingsbury Stream, Piper Pond, Greenleaf Pond, and Drummond Pond. There is excellent access to ATV and Snowmobile trails to explore.

SHIRLEY

Shirley is located in Piscataquis County. It has a population of 251, according to the 2020 Census. The former railroad tracks in Shirley



have been made into a multi-use recreation trail. It's mainly used for ATV and Snowmobile access.



There are many recreational opportunities for wildlife watching at Shirley Pond in the center of town. This is a particularly nice spot to see loons. On the outskirts of the town is Shirley Bog, where you can sometimes spot moose feeding on aquatic plants.

GREENVILLE & GREENVILLE JUNCTION



Greenville is in Piscataquis County. It has a population of 1,437, according to the 2020 Census. The town is centered on the lower end of Moosehead Lake, known as East Cove. Greenville is the historic gateway to the vast Northern Maine Wilderness. The service area to the vast Northern Maine Wilderness. You can get almost all the supplies you need for a remote camping or hiking experience here.

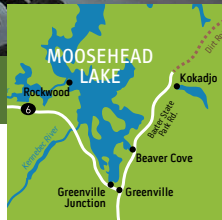
Greenville Junction is an unincorporated village in the town of Greenville. It is also located on the shores of Moosehead Lake, known as West Cove. You will find parking and boat launches at Greenville Junction Wharf, as well as trail heads with snowmobiling and ATV access.

BEAVER COVE

Beaver Cove is in Piscataquis County. It has a population of 133 according to the 2020 Census. This town is named after the cove in Moosehead on the southeastern side of the lake. You can access Elephant Mountain in Beaver Cove, where you will find the B52 Crash Site. Lily Bay State Park is less than 3 miles from the center of town.



KOKADJO

Kokadjo is a village in the unorganized Frenchtown Township in Piscataquis County. They are famous for their welcome to Kokadjo sign that says “population not many.” This area is home to the Roach River and First Roach Pond.



This little village is the last stop before you head out into the remoteness of the Northern Maine Woods.

ROCKWOOD

This area is the access point to Mount Kineo. It rises 763 feet above the level of Moosehead Lake to a total height of 1,958 feet above sea level. Kineo was first discovered around 11,000 years ago by indigenous people and has a rich history in many indigenous tribes in Maine and the northeast. The locals refer to Rockwood as “The Heart of Moosehead.”

FOUR SEASONS IN THE MOOSEHEAD LAKE REGION



WINTER TIPS:



- Be sure to pack extra clothes and appropriate footwear. Between changing conditions and different levels of excursion, you may put on and take off layers several times in one trip.
- Bring an emergency kit with extra food, water and emergency supplies, including a thermal blanket.
- Make a plan and don't head out on your own. Ensure someone knows where you're headed and when you should return.

SPRING TIPS:



- Roads surrounding the North Woods in the springtime can be filled with mud and potholes due to frost leaving the ground. Be sure to bring the right vehicle for your outdoor adventures.
- The weather can change quickly in this region, so for guests heading outdoors on foot to explore, mud boots, rain jackets, and even gloves, are needed at times in the spring.
- When you see wildlife make sure you give them space, especially if they have their offspring with them. These are wild animals so respect their habitat and don't try to pet or feed them.

SUMMER TIPS:



- Be sure to bring your sunscreen with you. While you are in the state of Maine, where we see snow 6 months out of the year, the summer sun will leave its mark if you forget to apply sunscreen.

- When heading out to explore the North Woods of Maine it is wise to bring along insect repellent. Also, after recreating outdoors, make sure you check for ticks. We do have a variety of tick species, including deer ticks which can carry Lyme Disease.
- Whether you are planning to explore our lakes and ponds by boat, kayak or canoe, you will need to have floatation devices for everyone onboard. Check the laws for specifics regarding water recreation safety and fishing laws online at Maine.gov.

FALL TIPS:

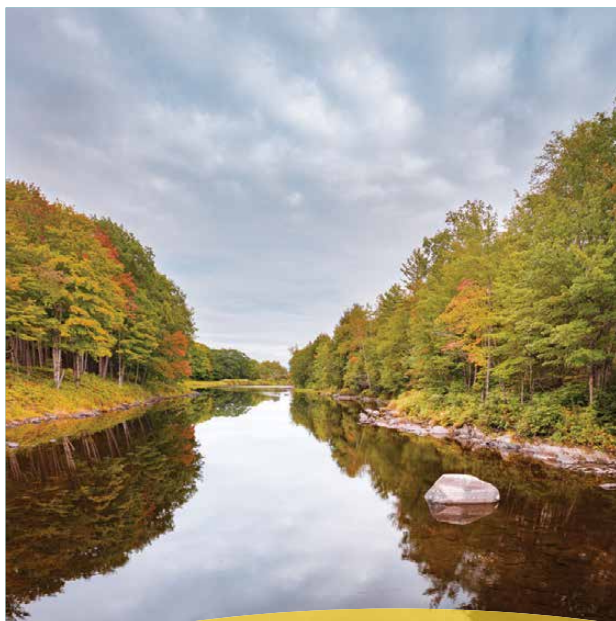


- Do not forget your camera at home! The colorful fall foliage begs you to bring your camera along with you. Wherever you go in the North Woods there is a photograph just waiting to be taken.
- Hiking in the fall is a must while visiting Moosehead so be sure to pack your hiking boots. The quiet of the woods and the scent of the pine trees surrounding you make it the perfect fall activity.
- When recreating outdoors at the end of September-November, it's wise to wear a hat or bandana with hunter orange as hunting is actively happening in the region.

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WINTER AT THE MOOSEHEAD LAKE REGION

Winter in the Moosehead Lake region is a serene season characterized by snowy landscapes, cold temperatures, and various winter sports activities.

As the winter season arrives, the Moosehead Lake region is transformed into a winter wonderland with snow-covered hills, forests, and lakes. It's a perfect environment for winter sports such as skiing, snowboarding, snowmobiling, and snowshoeing.

The most popular activity in the region is snowmobiling. There are hundreds of miles of trails to explore. You can ride for miles seeing different regions in our state while making the Moosehead Lake region your home base.

Ice fishing is also popular in the Moosehead Lake region during the winter months. The region's lakes and rivers freeze over, allowing anglers to catch fish, such as Togue, brook trout, salmon, and cusk. Several ice fishing derbies take place throughout the region in February and March.

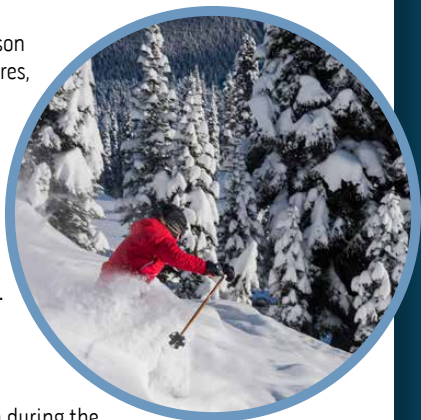

ICE FISHING



Fishing doesn't have to stop when the weather turns cold. Fishermen continue to pursue brook trout, cusk, salmon and togue all winter long on Moosehead Lake, ponds and other lakes in our region.

Many fishermen utilize snowmobiles or ATVs with tracks in the winter months due to the size of Moosehead Lake and the numerous other ponds and lakes open to ice fishing. Please be aware of the ice conditions. It is always wise to test the ice the ice in the area you plan to fish in.

It's always important before going out on a fishing trip that you have a valid Maine State Fishing License and know the laws of the Lake or Pond you are fishing on.

SNOWMOBILING

The Moosehead Lake Region is home to one of the Northeast's largest winter playgrounds. Dedicated snowmobile club members and groomers keep hundreds of miles of well-marked Interconnected Trail System (ITS) and local trails in top condition.

If you are considering hitting the trails for the first time by sled, renting snowmobiles is a great way to get the experience you crave. The best riding conditions are typically from mid-January through mid-March, but it can vary due to annual snowfall and temperature.

When riding on lakes and ponds, please stay on marked trails as there can be open water in certain locations in the middle of winter. All snowmobiles must be registered to ride in the state of Maine.

REMEMBER: Respect all landowners and their property. Always stay on marked trails and ride right.

SKIING OPPORTUNITIES

DOWNHILL ALPINE SKIING

Come "Ski the View"! Big Moose Mountain is located in the heart of the Moosehead Lake Region with groomed trails, ski lifts and a recently renovated ski lodge. They offer an extensive ski school with multiple "Learn to Ski" and "Learn to Board" programs taught by ski/board instructors.

The Friends of the Mountain a local non-profit organization that has run the ski area on Big Moose Mountain since 2012. They strive to keep the mountain open and affordable for the region's residents and visitors so they can enjoy skiing with one of the most beautiful views in the state!

CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING

- **The Appalachian Mountain Club** boasts 90 miles of groomed both tracked and untracked backcountry skiing
- **The Birches** offers groomed trails with a variety of terrain for all levels of experience. Ski-in lodging is available at their yurts

SNOWSHOEING



While the Moosehead Lake area is a fantastic destination for snowshoeing.

Snowshoeing is as easy as putting one foot in front of the other! Granted you will have platforms strapped to your feet, but you'll enjoy the adventure walking over the snow-covered landscape! It's a wonderful activity for the entire family to enjoy!

If you are new to snowshoeing, there are rentals available in our region, and even some lodging properties have equipment available to their guests. If you are new to snowshoeing, there are rentals available in our region, and even some lodging properties have equipment available to their guests.

There are a number of different winter snowshoe trails available for you and your family to explore in the Moosehead Lake area:

- Right behind the Moosehead Lake Visitor

Center located at 480 Moosehead Lake Rd., in Greenville

- Lily Bay State Park
- Big Moose Mountain
- **The Birches** in Rockwood
- **Appalachian Mountain Club Maine Wilderness Lodges**

If a trail is groomed for cross-country skiing make sure you are staying to the side of the groomed trail, so you aren't messing up the tracks for the skiers. You should never walk on a groomed trail.

REMEMBER: Make sure to stay to the side of the groomed trail cross country ski trails. You should never walk on a groomed skiing trail.

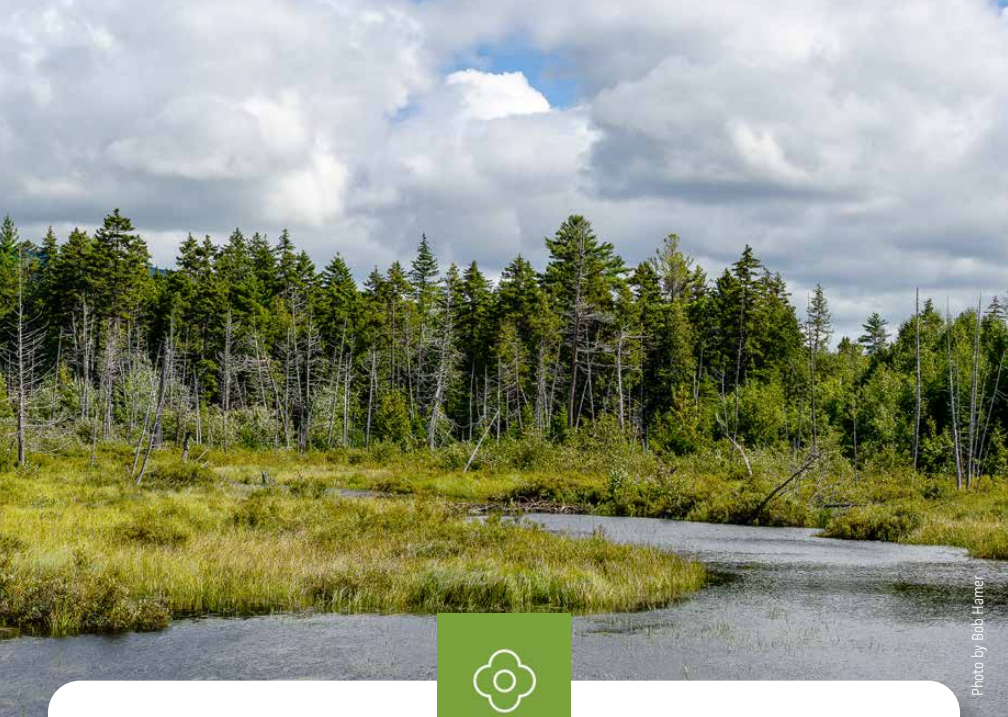

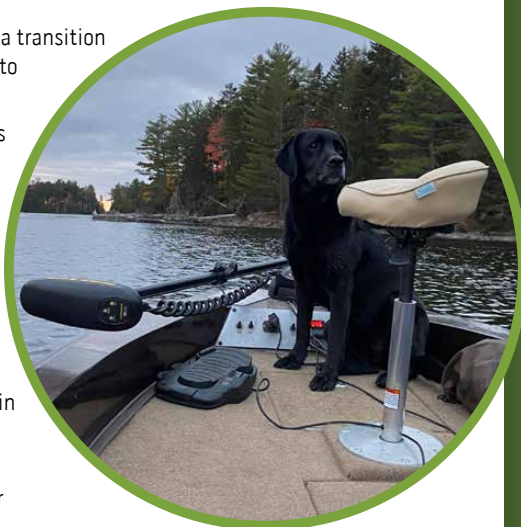
SPRING AT THE MOOSEHEAD LAKE REGION

Spring in the Moosehead Lake Region is a transition from cold and snowy winter conditions to warmer and milder temperatures.

In early Spring, the region still experiences snow and ice, occasional snowstorms, and freezing temperatures. However, as the season progresses, the snow melts, and the landscape shows signs of new life.

Spring is also a popular time for wildlife viewing, as many animals come out of hibernation and begin to forage for food. Moose, black bears, and white-tailed deer are just a few species that can be spotted in the region during this time of year.

In late Spring, the region's many trails and waterways provide ample opportunities for exploration and adventure.





FISHING

Spring is the start of open water fishing in our region. From landlocked salmon to brook and lake trout, Moosehead Lake provides endless opportunities for every fisherman. In addition to Moosehead Lake, there are more than forty ponds and lakes that provide even more opportunities for fishermen to explore. The best fly-fishing can be found at the East and West Outlets of the Kennebec River and the Moose River beginning in April.

Our region has Registered Maine Guides for your dream fishing trip. If you are thinking of hiring a fishing guide make sure you book your trip early, due to our guides being in high demand. Take a look at page 68 for a list of registered guides in the Moosehead Lake Region.

Be sure to have a valid fishing license before you head out on Maine's beautiful waters.

TIP: When looking to hire a guide make sure you do so well in advance.

BIRDING

The Moosehead Lake Region is a perfect location for birding. In fact, it was the first area in the state to be researched and mapped for the Maine Birding Trail. Almost every warbler of the northern forest can be found here. Even hard-to-find species thrive in the area, including spruce grouse, boreal chickadee, gray jay, black-backed woodpecker, Bicknell's thrush and white-winged crossbill.

While visiting the North Woods you will also have opportunities to see water loons, herons, kingfishers, songbirds and birds of prey. It isn't hard to see why Moosehead is a birding destination!

Birders interested in hiking should venture into Monson and explore the trails on Borestone Mountain, which is an Audubon Sanctuary.

Spring provides amazing opportunities for bird watching, but guests can be sure they will catch a glimpse of birds that call the Moosehead Lake region their home all year long.



MOOSE WATCHING

Moose prefer solitude and deep woods cover in their habitat, so it is no surprise that the Moosehead Lake region has been claimed as home by these elusive animals for years. An intricate network of abandoned woods roads provides countless opportunities to spot moose throughout all four seasons and professional guide services offer unsurpassed access to the mooses' deepest woods territory.

Popular Moose Hangouts

- **Department of Transportation Garage (DOT), Shirley** – Head south approximately 2.9 miles from the Visitor's Center and on your right is one of the best places for sighting moose in the area. If heading north towards Greenville, as you drive through Shirley, be sure to look for the DOT sign. Moose will often be seen directly across the street.

TIP: For the best experience and to increase your chances of seeing a moose, we suggest hiring a guide to take you on a moose/wildlife tour. Book your tours early, as this is a very popular activity!

- **Lily Bay Road, Kokadjo** – Take a scenic drive to Kokadjo, a small community north of Greenville. Stay on Lily Bay Road for approximately 20 miles and keep your eyes open for moose along the way.
- **Lazy Tom Bog, Kokadjo** – If you've reached Kokadjo and still haven't had your fill of moose sightings, head to Lazy Tom Bog by continuing 1.5 miles past the bridge. Stay to your left, then take the intersection to the left and continue half a mile to the bridge that crosses Lazy Tom Stream.
- **Rt. 6/15 North, Rockwood/Jackman** – After leaving Greenville you'll find approximately 20 miles of the North Woods of Maine before you reach the village of Rockwood. Moose are often seen along the roadside, so keep your eyes peeled. Another 20+ miles of woods separate Rockwood from Jackman and moose sightings are frequent along this stretch of the main road leading to Canada.



MOOSE FACTS

The Maine state mammal's size is both impressive and intimidating by any measure. A fully grown male moose, called a bull, can reach 6 ft. in height at the shoulder and can weigh upwards of 1400 lbs.

- They enjoy dining on aquatic plants in the summer months and tree bark, leaves and balsam fir in the cooler seasons.
- While clumsy in appearance, moose are actually able to run at speeds of 35 mph and can swim over 10 miles at a time.
- The best times of day to see moose are early in the morning or at dusk, while the best time of year is from mid-spring through late June.
- The flap of skin under a moose's throat is called a bell.
- Moose have no top front teeth.
- Only male moose grow antlers, which they shed in early winter and re-grow during

the year. The main function of antlers is for display during the mating season.

- The first law to protect moose was passed in 1930.
- After their first calf, moose quite often have twins.
- Moose can only see about 25 feet.
- Moose prefer shady, wet areas such as bogs and marshes.
- After dark, moose are very hard to spot standing on the road high above vehicle headlights. Always remain alert when driving at night. A moose encounter can result in great damage to vehicles and passengers.

BOATING • KAYAKING • CANOEING

Moosehead Lake and the surrounding ponds, streams, and rivers provide the boater, canoeist, paddleboarder and kayaker with unlimited opportunities for water-based adventures. Typically, the best time for water activities is from Memorial Day through early September.

Please use caution in shallow bays and coves. The lake is marked with hazard buoys beginning 200 feet from shore. Public launch facilities for Moosehead Lake are available in Greenville, Rockwood, and Seboomook.

For those searching for privacy and solitude for kayaking or canoeing, scores of smaller lakes and ponds are waiting to be explored.

Our region's smaller lakes and ponds offer public launching; however, some are vehicle accessible, while others are carry-in.

GOLF

Although our courses are small, they offer cart and club rentals with no tee time required. Come enjoy your vacation without the hassle of traveling with your clubs and take in some of the most incredible mountain and lake views as you tee off.

MOUNT KINEO GOLF COURSE **9 HOLE. PAR 36. 3000+ YARDS**

The Mount Kineo Golf Course is located on Moosehead Lake and is considered the second oldest course in New England since it was built in the 1880s. Each hole on this nine-hole course is challenging and will test the clubs in your bag. The most scenic hole is the fourth...a par three... 138-yarder over water to a green nestled at the base of Mount Kineo.

This course does require you to take a water shuttle.

This course may appear simple on paper but don't be fooled, as their small greens require a skilled shot.

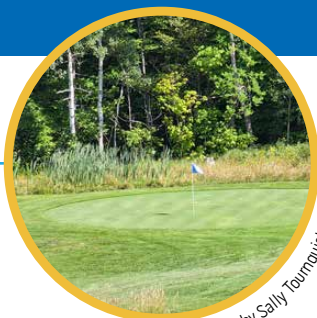

Lily Bay State Park in Beaver Cover features a sand beach that is great for families with children of all ages.

Red Cross Beach is a great swimming beach tucked up inside the woods in downtown Greenville with a lifeguard on duty during specific summer hours.

The Greenville Junction Wharf includes a lakeside playground for kids to enjoy while visiting the beach.

Monson Public Beach on Blanchard Road features a sandy beach with large floats you can swim to and jump off.

Little Wilson Falls in Monson is part of the Appalachian Trail that includes pools perfect for summertime swimming. Please be careful; the rocks surrounding the pools can be very slippery.

Moosehead Lake is at the heart of whitewater rafting in Maine, located between world-class whitewater on the Kennebec River (family fun rafting experience) and the Penobscot River (more adventurous whitewater trip), with daily rafting trips and transportation. There are guide and outfitter services in our state's Moosehead Lake region and West Forks region.

Since whitewater rafting is an outdoor adventure ideal for ages 8+, it is an excellent way for friends and family to reconnect with each other and soak in the best of Maine outdoors!

FALL AT THE MOOSEHEAD LAKE REGION

Fall in the Moosehead Lake region is a magical time of year, with stunning foliage displays, comfortable outdoor temperatures, and plenty of outdoor activities. It's an ideal time to experience the region's natural beauty before the winter snow sets in.

Hiking is popular in the Moosehead Lake region during the fall months. The region has hundreds of miles of trails, ranging from strolls to challenging hikes. Some of the most popular trails include the Gulf Hagas Trail, the B-52 Crash Site Trail, and the Appalachian Trail, which passes through the region.

Fall is also an excellent time for fishing in the Moosehead Lake region. The region's lakes and rivers are full of landlocked salmon, lake trout, and other species, making it a prime destination for anglers.

Other fall activities include scenic drives, hunting, wildlife viewing, and ATVing.

Miles of ATV trails winding through the North Woods are waiting for you to explore in the autumn!

Trail volunteers and clubs do an incredible job of maintaining well-marked ATV trails throughout the Moosehead Lake region. ATV trails are typically open from Late May to mid-November, when they close in preparation for snowmobiling. With more than 300 miles of trails, it is possible to go out for just a couple of hours of fun or make a day of it.

Greenville and Rockwood allow ATVs to travel through the main parts of town. Pay attention to signs directing where and when ATVs can travel on roads when traveling in town. Riders also need to pay attention to observed quiet times in our towns. We have local businesses where you can rent them or even set up a guided ATV trip for the best riding experience!

FLY FISHING

Fly fishermen will find plenty of pools, pocket waters, and rapids to dangle their fly over while visiting the Moosehead Lake region. We are known for brook trout, landlocked salmon, and smallmouth bass. The Moose River, found on the western shore of Moosehead in the quaint village of Rockwood, is a tailwater tributary to Moosehead Lake, offering great spring and fall fishing for Salmon and Brook Trout. It can be accessed by canoe, from the shore, or by wading.

The East Outlet of the Kennebec River, the largest river in the Moosehead region, offers cold, clean water from Moosehead. It is fly fishing only, and parts are open year-round. Spring and fall are the prime times. This river includes Class III rapids, so it is best to hire a drift boat fishing guide to navigate these waters by boat. Wade fishing is popular here, with easy access to fishing trails from the parking lot.

The Roach River, on the eastern side of Moosehead, is also a tributary to Moosehead Lake. Don't let its small size fool you! This fly fishing only, catch and release, relatively remote fishery produces excellent fish from a smaller stream-like river. The early Spring season smelt run and sucker spawn or fall spawning runs should not be missed.

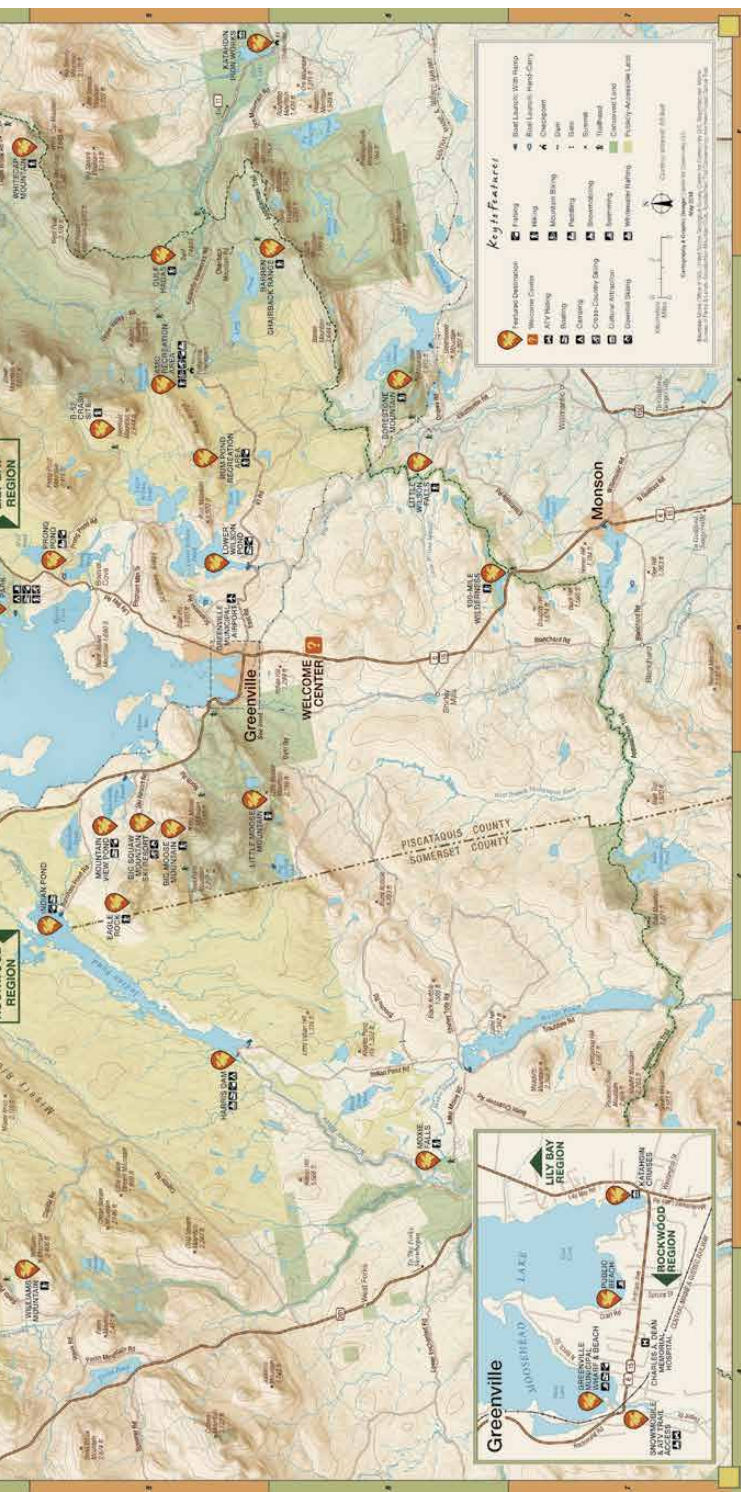

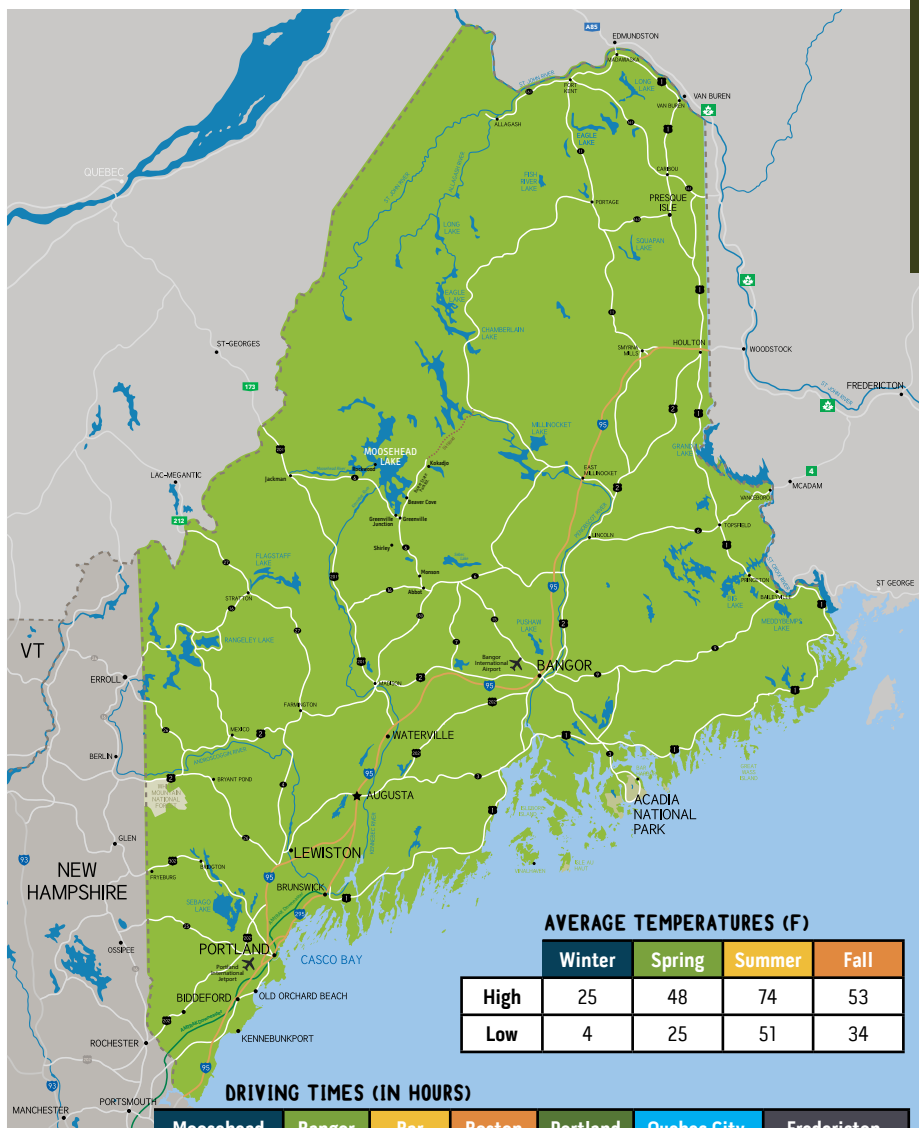

HUNTING

The Moosehead Lake region offers many exciting opportunities for hunters of all ages. Located in the heart of the wildlife region, Moosehead boasts some of the best hunting grounds in the Northeast. The vast, sparsely inhabited woods are home to the prized game, while the overlay of backcountry roads provides accessibility.

Hunters can enjoy the thrill of pursuing whitetail deer, black bear, partridge, and moose. Black bear and moose seasons kick off in September and last through November, followed by deer and partridge hunting starting in October and lasting into December.

Many reputable local guides help you achieve the best hunting experience possible. If this is your first time in the Moosehead area or you would like more expertise, we recommend using a guide.

SCENIC DRIVES

As summer turns to fall, the transition in the Moosehead Lake region is extraordinary. Every year, autumn displays brilliant red, yellow, and orange hues. The typical “leaf-peeping” season is from mid-September through mid-October. The change in the landscape from the greens of summer is breathtaking.

POPULAR SCENIC DRIVES AROUND MOOSEHEAD

GREENVILLE - ROCKWOOD - JACKMAN - BINGHAM - ABBOT LOOP

This half-day trip (approximately 150 miles) takes you past lakes, mountain views, and a scenic river valley. There are several towns to stop in for souvenirs, coffee, and a good lunch. Directions: From downtown Greenville, take Rt. 6/15 North through Rockwood to Jackman. Turn left on Rt. 201 South toward Bingham. Turn left on Rt. 16 East to Abbot Village. Turn left on Rt. 6/15 North to head back to Greenville.

GREENVILLE - KOKADJO

This trip is approximately 20 miles one way and will take you up the eastern shore of Moosehead Lake. Past the spectacular overlook at Blair Hill, several moose bogs, ponds, and fabulous mountain views can be found. There is a trading post in Kokadjo, where you can shop for souvenirs and food. Directions: From downtown Greenville take Lily Bay Rd. North, approximately 20 miles to Kokadjo.

GREENVILLE - MONSON - ELLIOTSVILLE - WILLIMANTIC LOOP

This loop is about 45 miles long. It will take you by spectacular views of Borestone and Barren Mountain, as well as over a couple of scenic bridges that span Wilson Stream. There are sprawling fields and old New England farmhouses. If you need refreshments, be sure to stop in at one of the shops in Monson. Directions: From downtown Greenville follow Rt. 6/15 South towards Monson. Just after the “Welcome to Monson” sign, turn left onto Elliottsville Road. After you cross the cement bridge crossing Wilson Stream, follow the fork to the right. At this point, the route will turn to gravel. You will then cross Wilson Stream again on a bridge with iron grates. Turn right onto Rt. 150. Approximately 3-4 miles later, you will turn right on North Guilford Rd. When this road ends, turn right onto Rt. 6/15 in Monson. This road will lead you back to Greenville.



SEAPLANE RIDES

While you can go on a seaplane ride at Moosehead three seasons out of the year, autumn is a beautiful time to take a trip in the sky to take in nature's colorful view of the woods.

A scenic tour in a seaplane truly is a great way to appreciate and experience the vastness of the Moosehead Lake region. The woods, lakes, mountains, and ponds stretch as far as the eye can see.

Seaplanes hold a very special place in the history of Moosehead Lake, and this heritage is celebrated every year at the International Seaplane Fly-In. This event is held on the weekend after Labor Day yearly and is by far the most popular annual event in the county.

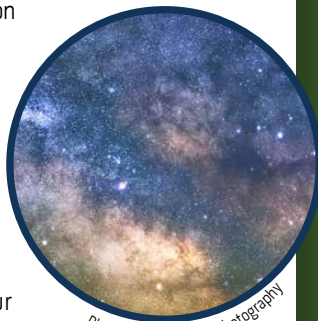

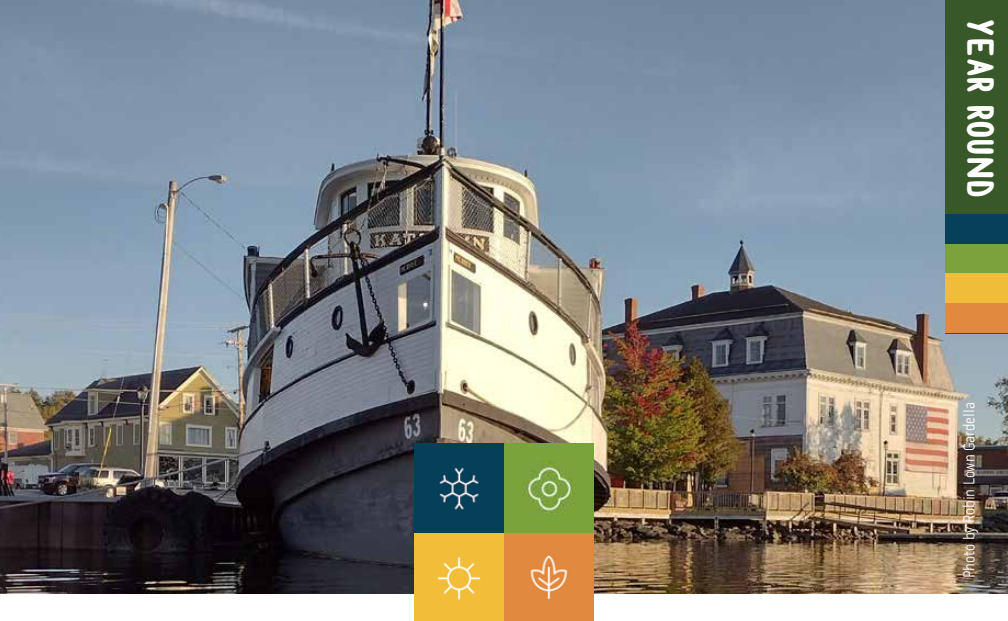

YEAR-ROUND ACTIVITIES

MOOSEHEAD LAKE REGION HISTORY



The Moosehead Lake region is rich in history. Our region is the home of the Wabanaki people, who were the first settlers of the Moosehead

Lake region. The last log drive in the United States occurred in our region in 1976 using the steamboat Katahdin, which still sails on Moosehead Lake daily from June to October.

A more tragic part of our region's history is the B-52 Crash in January 1963 on Elephant Mountain. A crew of six with three observers on a training mission out of Westover AFB in Massachusetts crashed due to structural failures. There were only two survivors who then faced -30 degree temperatures until they were rescued. To learn and experience our history, make sure to make a stop at one or all of our local museums:
